Selecting Women's Ministry Presentations

There will be a handful of presentations at the WELS Women's Ministry Conference. We understand it might be hard to read through their descriptions online and keep them straight in your head. So, our hope is that this document helps as you decide which presentations you would like to attend. You can print this and mark it up. Then, when you go to register, you will know exactly which presentations you are picking. This will explain the differences between the presentations, the various types of breakouts that we have offered, and ways you and your congregation might maximize what it takes from the conference.

KEYNOTE PRESENTATIONS

The conference has four keynote presentations, three held on Monday and one on the last day of the conference. These keynotes are intended for every attendee. The foundation for the 2024 Women's Ministry conference, "Empowered to Proclaim," is Luke's account of the spread of the kingdom of God by the power of the Holy Spirit through God's chosen apostles and everyday believers. Learn how these early Christians—who had just witnessed or been told of the ministry, suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension of the Lord Jesus Christ—were emboldened and empowered by the Holy Spirit to spread the word. All our keynote presentations on Monday will revolve around this theme. On the last day of the conference, the keynote will be a more conversational format, "Question and Answer" style.

BREAKOUT PRESENTATIONS

There are 15 breakout presentations, one of which is considered an "intensive". This means it will be digging deep n to the study of Acts and cannot cover the topic in just one breakout sessions. It will expand over two breakout sessions. Attendees choose their top four in the registration form. If selecting the two-session breakout, you will still have to select an extra back-up breakout option. We also ask you to provide two alternative choices, in the event that a top-four choice has reached capacity. If you have selected the two-session breakout and are allotted that before reaching capacity, you will indeed be scheduled to expand two sessions, and will have one less breakout topic to attend. The breakouts are narrower in scope. Some are niche, applicable only to certain interests of individuals. And the breakouts fall into a number of categories.

BREAKOUT PRESENTATION "TRACKS"

As you read through the breakout presentation descriptions, you will note some crossover. This is by design. It is easy to construct a breakout presentation track that allows a congregation or individual to dig into a topic more extensively. Here are five examples.

SEASONED CHRISTIAN – Are you a seasoned Christian woman who needs to refresh your daily habit of being in the Word? Learn a variety of ways to build the Word into your daily life, making God's Word a priority.

LAY PERSON – Are you a lay person who feels you have been called to greater influence as a Christian in an increasingly anti-Christian culture? Become familiar with resources available through Martin Luther College, Wisconsin Lutheran College, and Bethany Lutheran College, as well as through Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary and Northwestern Publishing House.

YOUNG CHRISTIAN – Are you a young Christian woman, struggling in a society that has abandoned God? Learn how to live and witness in a world that does not recognize Jesus. Make connections with others who feel the same isolation.

LOVES TO GATHER – Are you a woman who loves to gather with other women around God's Word, but don't know how to start? Learn how to start a Bible study (inside or outside the church) or host your own retreat by gaining wisdom from women who have sound, established practices and resources.

MOTHER OR GRANDMOTHER – Are you a mother or grandmother concerned about raising or assisting the next generation in raising a godly family? Learn how to incorporate the teachings of Jesus into family life in all stages.

SINGLE WOMAN – Are you a single woman who feels isolated when all the conversation is aimed at couples and families? Challenges of living in a culture increasingly hostile to Christianity and God's guidance for joy-filled and purposeful relationships? Join in scriptural guidance and discussion to be encouraged in your walk with Jesus.

WANT TO SERVE – Want to serve within your own congregation? Learn how to work more closely with your pastor and congregation leadership in your church.

WANT TO LEARN – Want to learn more about the everyday early Christians and how they grew from fear to boldness in their Christian lives? Do an intensive study on the book of Acts and watch how apostles and everyday Christians, empowered by the Holy Spirit, worked together in the spread of the kingdom of God.

IN SUMMARY

Since 2007, sisters in Christ have joined together around God's Word in a conference presented by WELS Women's Ministry to be equipped, nurtured, and encouraged in our walks of faith. These conferences include worship and keynote speaker-based presentations from a book of the Bible (this year from Acts). Numerous breakout sessions are being offered, with each participant choosing breakouts that best suit individual needs.

Breakout 1

THE BAPTISMAL LIFE

SPIRIT-FUELED RESILIENCE FOR TODAY'S CHALLENGES

Breakout 4

LEADERSHIP IN A WORLD THAT DOES NOT RECOGNIZE JESUS

We all experience firsthand the world that we live and work in: a world that does not recognize Jesus as Lord of all creation—a world that does not acknowledge the saving work of Jesus, saving work that has rescued us from our sins and through faith promises eternity with him in heaven. And that is just the beginning. We live in a world that is still governed by the words of our Lord God in Genesis 3 to put hostility between those of the world and those who put their trust in Jesus. And we can sure feel that hostility. It is not easy. It is not fun. And it perplexes us when we try to understand what we may have done wrong to earn such treatment . . . perplexes us until we return to God's Word and lean on Jesus instead of our own understanding.

In such a world that is openly hostile to Jesus and his followers, how are we to be effective leaders in our vocation, that station in life the Lord has assigned to us? How are we to honor our Lord with our decisions, plans, strategy, and approach when these can turn those we collaborate with against us? We all hold tight to the promise of our place being secure in the kingdom that is coming. But how do we have confidence to lead in our world when so many openly criticize what we stand for?

In this presentation, thoughts and experiences will be shared that will provide some leadership guidance in how to approach such situations and reflections that point us back to Jesus, our strength in time of need. This side of eternity there are no remedies to end such difficulties; however, we can draw lessons from God's Word and apply them as we put our faith into action in our vocation and life.

Breakout 5

"WHO AM I?" THE CRISIS AMONG TEENS TODAY

The pressures, challenges, and real-life problems that teens experience today could not have been foreseen by previous generations. These many problems often overwhelm teens with all kinds of feelings: of being unloved, worthless, guilty, anxious, lonely, and more. To fight this, we will look to establish and root our identity in Christ through the facts of God's Word instead of personal feelings.

The presentation will offer real-life counseling suggestions to those who work with, teach, pastor, or lead teens. Along with exploring the identity crisis among teens, this session will also offer suggestions for how to encourage teens to activate and involve them in ministry. The information for this session comes from careful research and intimate knowledge of teen life over years of ministry.

THE POWER OF STORY

Note: The Bible will be the "textbook" for this study. Be sure to bring one with you to both breakouts. Also, there will be recommended sections of Acts that will be very helpful to read prior to the breakouts. Taking advantage of the opportunity to read those sections ahead of time will enhance the discussion for everyone in the group.

THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS

Dr. Kristi Meyer & Rev. Eric Schroeder

Many congregations have vibrant and thriving women's ministries: natural places for female congregation members to volunteer and get involved. However, it can be difficult for women to participate in and contribute to other aspects of a church's ministry, especially if the congregation's governance model follows a typical male-only board structure. In these situations, partnerships are key—partnerships among all congregation members but especially partnerships between female members and their pastors.

In this session, we'll detail the real-life partnership that exists between the presenters and how this partnership naturally grew and developed over time. We'll look at how similar partnerships might be cultivated at other congregations, and we'll give some practical suggestions and tips for how session participants can get more involved at their local congregations.
